PROGRAMME DESIGN

Children are the most important assets of the nation and need to be nurtured in a dignified manner where they are protected and have access to all their entitlements for their holistic development. In an era where the digital world seamlessly intertwines with the lives of 'Digital Natives' - children growing up in an era of ubiquitous internet usage - new opportunities as well as risks emerge. As online threats, including those of violence and exploitation loom, it becomes imperative to understand children's online experiences and navigate the evolving digital landscape they inhabit. There are many children who are vulnerable in our country due to illiteracy and poverty etc. and therefore, they are exposed to be violence, abuse and exploitation. The vulnerability factors include children's internet usage, risks, and behaviour, whereas the protection factors include their preparedness and ability to address vulnerabilities in digital spaces, through knowledge, attitude, and practice. Additionally, it takes into account the response from parents and teachers as first responders and the perceptions of other key stakeholders - including the judiciary, police, lawyers, mental health professionals, non-profits, academia, media and government bodies. The NCRB report (Crime in India 2023) is also reflected that the trend of cybercrime is going upwards continuously, distribution of last five years cybercrime cases in the country reflected in the table below;

Further, it has also been mentioned that 1384 children in 2022 and 1736 children in 2023 have been targeted through cyber-crimes for abused and exploitation.

Cyber-crime, refers to any illegal activity that is committed through the use of the internet or other forms of digital communication. The cybercrime may have been involved in the commission of different type of crimes and also may be targeted to threaten a person, company or a nation's security and financial health. There are many privacy concerns surrounding cybercrime when confidential information may be intercepted or disclosed, lawfully or otherwise. The cyber-crime is emerging as a global problem with serious implications for societies and economies around the world. The growing reach of the Internet, the rapid spread of mobile information and communications technologies (ICTs) and the wide diffusion of social media have presented new opportunities and enabled various efforts to address violence against women and children. However, they are also being used as tools to inflict harm on women and children.

Online abuse refers to any harmful or offensive behavior that takes place on the internet. This can include things like cyber bullying, harassment, threats, and hate speech. Online abuse can be described as a range of behaviors that causes harm or distress to another person. Online abuse

includes personal harassment and/or attacks towards an individual or against a group of people. Online abuse can have serious consequences for the people who experience it, including emotional distress, mental health problems, and even physical harm. This can include things like cyber bullying, grooming, harassment, and exposure to inappropriate content. It's important to note that online crimes can have serious consequences, both for the victims and for society as a whole. Additionally, online criminals are becoming more sophisticated and their methods are becoming more advanced, so it's very important to stay vigilant and stay informed about the latest trends and technologies in order to stay ahead of potential risks.

Cyber bullying is a common form of online abuse of children. It can include things like sending mean messages, spreading rumors, or posting embarrassing photos or videos online. Children who experience cyber bullying may feel isolated, anxious, or depressed, and it can have a negative impact on their mental health. Grooming is another type of online abuse of children, where an adult uses the internet to build a relationship with a child with the intent of sexually exploiting them. They may use manipulative tactics to gain the child's trust, and may even pretend to be a child themselves. Children may also be exposed to inappropriate content online, such as sexually explicit material or extremist ideologies. This can be highly distressing for children and can have a negative impact on their well-being.

Social media has made it very easy for us to communicate quickly and easily with family, friends and acquaintances, as well as sharing experiences and letting others know of our opinions and beliefs. These opinions and beliefs may be about world events or local affairs, politics or religion, interests, affiliations, organisations, products, people and a wide variety of other topics. Our conversations and comments can be closely targeted or widely broadcast to the point that depending on the subject, they can go viral. Unfortunately, social media is also widely used by abusers, for sexually and financial exploitation etc. Many perpetrators 'hide' themselves behind the fact that they may not be able to be easily identified, and they wouldn't consider saying face-to-face, which could be regarded as cowardly. Online abuse takes several forms, and victims are not confined to public figures. They can do any job, be of any age, gender, sexual orientation or social or ethnic background, and may be living anywhere.

It's important to keep in mind that online abuse of children can take many forms, including cyber bullying, sexual exploitation, and grooming, so it's important to be aware of the different types of abuse and the warning signs. Additionally, it is important for the Mission Vatsalya functionaries, to be vigilant and stay informed about the latest trends and technologies in order to stay ahead of potential risks. It can have serious consequences for a child's mental and emotional well-being of the child. So that, It is important for caregivers to educate children about the risks of online abuse, and how to stay safe online. It is important for caregivers, educators, and other functionaries to be aware of the potential risks and to take steps to protect children. This includes monitoring their online activity, educating them about online safety, and teaching them how to respond if they experience abuse. If a child is a victim of online abuse, it is important to report to the appropriate authorities as soon as possible. It is important to remember that online abuse is not always easy to spot, and that children may be reluctant to speak up about it. Therefore, it is important for caregivers and educators to be vigilant and take steps to protect children from online abuse. Additionally, platforms and providers have a responsibility to protect children from online abuse, including implementing policies and tools to prevent it and remove it when it occurs.

In order to prevent all children of different communities from online abuse, it is important that the Social Worker, Out Reach Worker and Community Volunteers should be equipped with the adequate knowledge of preventing children from online abuse. These are closest and an integral part of the community and enable to disseminate the message related to the preventive measures from cyber-crimes/ online abuse. Therefore, this training programme is being proposed for the functionaries of DCPU's i.e. Caregivers, Social Worker, Out Reach Worker and Community Volunteers etc. They can provide/share adequate knowledge with the other functionaries, school teachers, community leaders and parents for educating their children about online safety, as well as how a victim child should respond against abuse? and encourage children to speak up and report any instances of online abuse to the appropriate authorities, such as the Caregivers, parents, friends, police or school authorities. In this regard it is essential that the Social Worker, Out Reach Worker and Community

Volunteers should have proper and updated knowledge about online abuse and ways of protection from it, for dissemination of an authentic information to the school teachers, community leaders and parents as well as children, because awareness is the backbone of child protection from online abuse.

Rationale

The NCRB Report 'Crime in India 2023' indicates that the number of incidence of cybercrimes increasing rapidly day by day. The offenders using new techniques for targeting the peoples as well as children also. On the other hand, a research study entitled "Virtual Threats Real Harm: Decoding the Offline Impact of Digital Risks on Children" has been conducted by the British Asian Trust and Space2Grow. The findings of the study also indicated that there is an urgent need to address the digital media issues related to the children on priority basis. Some major findings are as under;

- i. About 78% of children have abysmally low digital safety knowledge, indicating a critical gap in their understanding of online risks. Therefore, develop and disseminate interactive safety content to educate children about digital risks, ensuring sustained awareness and empowerment. Conduct mass awareness campaigns on digital safety to reach a broader audience and reinforce preventive measures.
- ii. 81% of children lack safe spaces to report digital risks, highlighting a significant barrier to seeking help and 91% of children are unaware of how and where to report an online incident, underscoring the need for better reporting mechanism. Empower survivors of online harms to become advocates for policy change by sharing their lived experiences.
- iii. 47% of cases confirmed sexual exploitation, 24% confirmed forced labor, and 60% of movements were tech-facilitated. 56% of tech-facilitated movements happened without family supervision. 26% of community members reported that children have not returned home for six months or more after moving away from their homes. For children who have not returned home in the past 6 months, 49% have not visited family since moving out, and 77% are reportedly unsafe.

The cyber vulnerability of children is a serious issue and is likely to accentuate in coming years. There is need to train the staff deployed in various child protection institutions in the country like - DCPUs, CWCs, JJ Boards, Child Helpline, etc. and adequately equip them to handle and support to the cyber-crimes committed against children. The Capacity Building Programmes run by NIPCCD and State Institutions need to incorporate the SoPs in their training curriculum.

Considering the above facts, it is imperative to update the knowledge of Mission Vatsalya functionaries and acquaint them with the update the knowledge about digital threats to prevent online abuse among the children. Keeping this in view, the Institute proposes to organize a **Capacity Building Programme on Virtual Threats and Impact of Digital Risk/Attack on Children and ensuring Cyber Safety and Online** from 28-29 May, 2026 at SPNIWCD Campus, New Delhi

Objectives

The main objectives of the training programme are to:

- i. to enable the participants about types of online abuses and its trend, committed against children and by children;
- ii. to analyze the impact of online abuse on children's mental health and measures for dealing with the same;
- iii. orient the participants about the functioning of the Cyber Cells/Cyber Grievance Redressal System and other mechanism to address the issue; and
- iv. ensure safety measures for protection of children from various online threats and precautionary steps to be taken for prevention from all types of online abuses etc.

Participants:

About 25 participants comprising functionaries of Mission Vatsalya i.e. DCPU Officials, Social Worker, Out Reach Worker and Community Volunteers, from selected States of the country would be invited for the Capacity Building programme.

Programme Coverage:

- a. Understanding about Cyber-crime, Trend analysis of cyber-crime against women and children, IT Act 2000 (Amended in 2008), other Acts formulated to address online crimes, Existing Legal Framework;
- b. Online and Offline Exploitation of Children;
- c. Understanding of emerging trends of online risks and linked vulnerabilities, Prevalence of Tech Facilitated Child Trafficking within the community;
- d. sensitization about Psycho social impact of online-crimes on the children, Need to Understand: How Children's motivations intersects by the digital Media;
- e. Safety measures for protection of children from various online threats and ways of prevention from all types of cyber-crime;
- f. 4Cs Protection Framework for Children: Children, Care Givers, Community and Child Safety Ecosystem;
- g. Child Safety Ecosystem;
- h. National Cyber Crime Reporting Portal, Cyber security awareness and Cyber hygiene for parents and precautionary steps for prevention from online abuse etc.

Expected Outcome

The participants will develop a clear understanding about severity of the issue, need and importance of prevention from online abuse including ways of protection through knowledge update about legal provisions implemented through IT Act 2000 (Amended in 2008) and other legislations; as well as their role and responsibilities to protect all children from online abuse.

Methodology

The participants will be provided conducive learning environment and participatory approach during the training programme. As the training programme is being organized in offline mode therefore, training techniques like lecture-cum- discussion and power point presentation would be used.

The medium of instructions in the training programme will be English/ Hindi.

Date & Duration:

The duration of the capacity building training programme will be two working days i.e. 28-29 May, 2026 and it will be conducted at its premises i.e. Savitribai Phule National Institute of Women and Child Development, 5 Siri Institutional Area, (Near Hauz Khas, Police Station) Hauz Khas, New Delhi-110016

Travel, Board and Lodging

For Outstation Non-official Participants

1. The outstation non-official participants (Chairperson and Members of CWCs and JJBs only) attending the training programme will be paid travel grant equivalent to **AC III tier rail** (including reservation charges)/actual bus fare by shortest route to and from Delhi.
2. The travel grant as payable under the Rules is calculated on the basis of fare by mail / Express trains and not Shatabdi, Rajdhani, Vande Bharat and Duronto Express.
3. Tatkal fares cannot be reimbursed and the fare in such cases will be restricted to the normal fare in that category of accommodation.
4. The journey by road to the nearest railway station/bus station will be paid as per the rules of the Institute to the non-official participants on the basis of actual expenditure incurred.

General Instructions:

The following general information may please be noted:

- i. The nomination should reach the Institute latest by 15th May, 2026.
 - ii. The participants are advised to make return reservation before leaving their respective places for participation in the programme.
 - iii. The accommodation will be available only for the duration of the programme and a day before and a day after the programme i.e. 27-30 May, 2026.
- a. The participants should proceed for participation in the programme only on receiving confirmation from the Institute. Participants are, therefore, requested to confirm acceptance of their nomination over telephone/e-mail before proceeding for the programme in case of delay/non-receipt of confirmation letter.
 - b. Any participant reporting to the programme late or leaving it before its conclusion or in case any participant does not attend all the sessions of the programme will not be entitled to Travel Grant and certificate.
